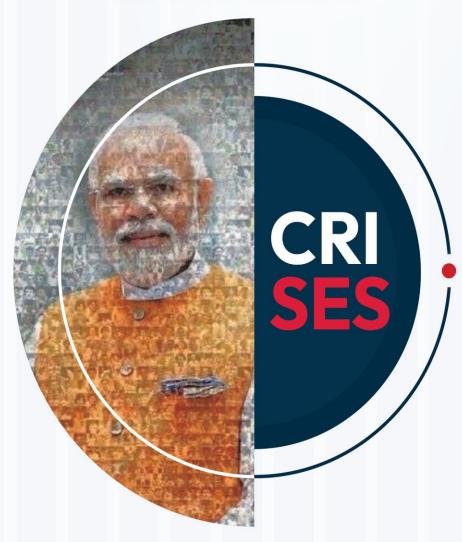

I. Executive Summary

Since taking office in May 2014, Prime Minister Narendra Modi has faced an extensive and varied set of national crises—ranging from terrorist attacks, aviation disasters, natural calamities, and industrial accidents, to global health emergencies and civil unrest. His leadership during these turbulent moments has been marked by swift decision-making, visible engagement, and a strategic blend of central command and inter-agency coordination.

This report examines over a decade of crisis leadership under Prime Minister Modi, presenting a **chronological and thematic analysis** of his government's responses to **major national emergencies** between **May 2014 and July 2025**. It draws upon **verified public records, official press releases, government data, and media reporting** to highlight how the Prime Minister's timely interventions have shaped both **short-term recovery efforts** and **long-term institutional resilience**.

Some of the most defining moments of his tenure include:

- The **2016 Uri terrorist attack** and subsequent **surgical strikes**, which demonstrated India's shift to proactive military retaliation under Modi's leadership.
- The **Balakot** air strikes (2019) in response to Pulwama, which not only represented decisive use of air power but also reshaped India's counterterrorism doctrine.
- The COVID-19 pandemic (2020–2021), where India saw a rapid imposition of lockdowns, launch of the PM CARES Fund, and later, a globally scaled vaccination drive.
- The **Balasore train accident (2023)** and **Air India crash (2025)**, which tested India's infrastructure safety systems and drew direct monitoring from the PMO.
- Natural calamities such as Cyclone Amphan (2020), the Kerala floods (2018–2019), and Sikkim floods (2023), where military-NDRF coordination and central funds were deployed within hours.
- Internationally lauded evacuation efforts like Operation Ganga (Ukraine, 2022) and Operation Kaveri (Sudan, 2023), reinforcing India's diplomatic and humanitarian capabilities.

What distinguishes PM Modi's approach to crisis management is a combination of:

- **Decisiveness**: Often taking firm actions in the first 24–48 hours after an event.
- **Direct Public Messaging**: Using platforms like *Mann Ki Baat*, Twitter, and televised addresses to maintain transparency and national unity.
- **Multi-level Coordination**: Involving central ministries, state governments, armed forces, disaster management teams (NDRF), and diplomatic channels.
- **Institutional Reforms**: Post-crisis reforms in disaster preparedness, infrastructure, defense strategy, and health systems.

At the same time, the report does not shy away from addressing **controversial moments** or **criticisms**, such as perceived under-responses during the **Delhi riots (2020)** or the **second wave of COVID-19**, offering a balanced view of achievements and limitations.

Ultimately, this report finds that Modi's crisis responses have evolved from **personality-driven interventions** to a more **systemic, institutionalized strategy** by 2025—demonstrating a learning curve shaped by India's complex and dynamic risk landscape.

II. Introduction

A Nation Tested, A Leader Observed

Modern leadership is often defined not by routine governance, but by how a leader navigates a nation through its most challenging and uncertain moments. In a country as vast, diverse, and densely populated as **India**, national crises—whether natural or man-

made—demand a combination of **strategic acumen**, **administrative coordination**, and **emotional intelligence**. Since assuming office on **May 26, 2014**, **Prime Minister Narendra Modi** has faced an extraordinary range of such crises, each testing the resilience of India's systems and the decisiveness of its leadership.

Purpose of the Report

This report provides a **comprehensive**, **evidence-based account** of how Prime Minister Modi has responded to **major national emergencies** during his tenure. It aims to:

- Document key crises and disasters from 2014 to 2025.
- Analyze the timing, nature, and impact of decisions taken by the Prime Minister and his government.

With India emerging as a major global player, the ability to withstand and recover from crises has become an essential component of national security, economic stability, and public trust. Understanding **how national leadership responds during turmoil** not only helps assess past performance but also prepares the foundation for **future resilience and governance models**.

This report, therefore, is not merely a chronicle of events but an **assessment of leadership under pressure**, viewed through the lens of real-world emergencies where **timeliness**, **empathy**, **and strategy intersected with national survival**.

III. Terror-Related Crises

Terrorism has remained one of the most persistent national security threats during Prime Minister Narendra Modi's tenure. From cross-border attacks to internal infiltrations, several high-casualty terror events tested the government's preparedness and resolve. What marked a shift under Modi's leadership was a transition from defensive posturing to proactive, retaliatory action—including surgical strikes and targeted air operations—backed by a clear diplomatic doctrine.

This section chronologically reviews the key terrorist attacks, the government's immediate and long-term responses, and the broader strategic outcomes.

1. Pathankot Airbase Attack – January 2, 2016

Incident Summary:

A heavily armed group of Pakistani terrorists attacked the Pathankot Air Force Station in Punjab. The attack, lasting over 17 hours, resulted in the death of 7 security personnel and all 6 attackers. It came days after PM Modi made a surprise goodwill visit to Pakistan (Dec 25, 2015) to meet then-PM Nawaz Sharif—raising diplomatic sensitivity.

Government Response:

- The NSG and IAF Garud commandos were immediately deployed.
- PM Modi chaired high-level security meetings within hours of the attack.
- He tweeted condolences and assured the nation of "no compromise" on security.
- Diplomatic channels were activated: **Pakistan was formally asked to cooperate in the investigation**, and India provided actionable intelligence.
- A **Joint Investigation Team (JIT)** from Pakistan was allowed to visit the site—an unprecedented move reflecting diplomatic tightrope walking.

Outcome:

- Mixed domestic reactions: While some praised Modi for transparency and restraint, critics argued it emboldened Pakistan.
- It laid groundwork for shifting policy post-Uri (see below).
- Marked Modi's first major test in balancing diplomacy with hardline security.

2. Uri Army Base Attack – September 18, 2016

Incident Summary:

Four heavily armed terrorists infiltrated the army brigade headquarters in Uri (J&K), killing **18 Indian soldiers**—the highest toll in decades. The nation demanded swift and strong action.

Government Response:

- PM Modi declared that those behind the attack "would not go unpunished."
- Just 11 days later, India conducted surgical strikes across the Line of Control (LoC)
 on terrorist launch pads in Pakistan-occupied Kashmir.
- The operation was announced publicly by the Director General of Military Operations (DGMO), with the political clearance directly from the PMO.
- PM Modi addressed public rallies, emphasizing India's right to defend itself preemptively.

• India launched a global diplomatic offensive to isolate Pakistan as a terror sponsor.

Outcome:

- The **surgical strikes were a watershed moment**: the first time India acknowledged such cross-border retaliation.
- Boosted morale within armed forces and public.
- Elevated Modi's image as a decisive national security leader.
- Set a new strategic doctrine of preemptive defense, later used during Balakot.

3. Amarnath Yatra Terror Attack - July 10, 2017

Incident Summary:

Militants opened fire on a bus of Amarnath pilgrims in Anantnag, J&K, killing **8 civilians** and injuring **18**.

Government Response:

- PM Modi tweeted condolences and called the attack "a cowardly act that will not be tolerated."
- Ministry of Home Affairs coordinated with J&K authorities to enhance Yatra security.
- The NIA launched an investigation, and several modules were arrested.

Outcome:

- Heightened security for religious events in future.
- Political messaging focused on unity and religious freedom.
- PM Modi condemned "terrorism in the name of religion" at multiple global forums following the attack.

4. Pulwama Attack & Balakot Airstrikes – February 2019

Incident Summary:

On **February 14, 2019**, a suicide bomber affiliated with Pakistan-based terrorist group **Jaishe-Mohammed (JeM)** rammed an explosive-laden vehicle into a convoy of **CRPF personnel** in Pulwama, Jammu and Kashmir. The attack killed **40 jawans**—one of the deadliest in decades. The incident triggered an unprecedented wave of national grief and anger, demanding strong retaliation.

Government Response:

Immediate Measures (Within 24–72 Hours):

• PM Narendra Modi condemned the attack publicly, stating:

"I assure every citizen of this country that the sacrifice of our jawans will not go in vain."

- National flags were flown at half-mast.
- PM chaired an emergency Cabinet Committee on Security (CCS) meeting.
- India withdrew Most Favoured Nation (MFN) status granted to Pakistan.
- Global diplomatic outreach was launched to isolate Pakistan at the UN, OIC, and FATF.

Decisive Military Retaliation – Balakot Airstrikes:

- On the morning of February 26, 2019, India carried out airstrikes deep inside
 Pakistani territory, targeting JeM training camps in Balakot, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa.
- The operation involved **12 Mirage-2000 aircraft**, dropping precision bombs.
- Indian government officially confirmed "a non-military, preemptive strike to avoid civilian casualties," but exact damage was not independently verified.
- PM Modi authorized the airstrikes after multi-agency inputs and political-military consultations.

Handling Escalation – February 27–28:

- The next day, Pakistan attempted a retaliatory air incursion over the LoC, leading to a dogfight in which Wing Commander Abhinandan Varthaman was captured.
- PM Modi's team worked via diplomatic and military backchannels.
- Under international pressure and India's firm stand, Pakistan returned Abhinandan within 60 hours.
- PM Modi's message of restraint with strength was noted globally.

Outcome and Strategic Impact:

- **First use of air power across the LoC since 1971**, signalling a paradigm shift in India's counterterrorism doctrine.
- Boosted domestic morale and nationalist sentiment ahead of the 2019 general elections.
- International media and think tanks credited India's "measured but bold response" and restraint in preventing all-out war.
- Led to an **increase in defense budget allocations**, modernization programs, and hardened counterterrorism laws (including amendments to UAPA).

• **Public messaging** by PM Modi emphasized unity, patriotism, and military pride:

"This is a new India. It will enter your house and kill you."

Noteworthy Leadership Aspects:

- **Speed of decision-making:** Airstrike authorization within 10 days.
- Diplomatic foresight: Pakistan faced pressure from US, France, UAE, and Saudi Arabia.
- Public morale management: Modi remained visible, vocal, and emotionally resonant.
- **Use of symbolism:** "Surgical strikes" and "Balakot" became shorthand for assertive leadership.

5. Parliament Security Breach – December 13, 2023

Incident Summary:

On the **22nd anniversary** of the 2001 Parliament terror attack, **two protesters breached Lok Sabha security** during a live session by jumping from the public gallery and releasing **colored smoke canisters**. Simultaneously, two others protested outside Parliament with similar smoke bombs. While the breach did not involve firearms or explosives, it raised **grave concerns about internal security** and symbolic threats to the seat of democracy.

Government Response:

Immediate Measures:

- Within hours, PM Modi held a **high-level security review meeting** with the Ministry of Home Affairs, Parliament Security Service, and Intelligence Bureau.
- Condemned the breach and expressed deep concern over **security lapses inside the**Parliament.
- Termed the incident an act of "grave disrespect to India's democracy."

Law Enforcement Actions:

- The four individuals involved were arrested and charged under the **Unlawful Activities Prevention Act (UAPA)**.
- Multiple alleged associates were detained in a nationwide investigation.

Parliamentary Fallout:

- The Lok Sabha witnessed chaos in subsequent sessions as opposition leaders demanded accountability.
- However, the government moved swiftly and decisively:
 - 146 opposition MPs were suspended, citing disruption of proceedings and security interference.
 - PM Modi backed the Speaker's decision, affirming the need to maintain order in the temple of democracy.

Security Reforms:

- A full **audit of Parliament security systems** was ordered.
- **Biometric re-verification** for access passes was initiated.
- The Delhi Police, under central directives, increased **surveillance and screening** around all government buildings.

Outcome and Strategic Impact:

- The incident **exposed vulnerabilities** in VIP security protocols, especially on symbolic anniversaries.
- PM Modi's **zero-tolerance approach** signaled that even non-lethal symbolic protests would be treated as serious threats to national security.
- Though criticized by some as an "overreaction" for using UAPA, the government defended the move as necessary deterrence.

Leadership Takeaways:

- Assertiveness in crisis framing: Modi publicly equated the breach with attacks on democratic values.
- Administrative decisiveness: Rapid investigation, security audit, and legislative clampdown.
- **Strategic messaging:** Positioned the state as uncompromising on institutional sanctity.

"Every Indian feels angered. This is not just a breach of security—it is a breach of trust in our democracy." — PM Modi (14 Dec 2023, via Twitter)

6. Reasi Bus Terror Attack - June 9, 2024

Incident Summary:

On June 9, 2024, terrorists ambushed a pilgrim bus in the Reasi district of Jammu and Kashmir, causing it to veer off a bridge and fall into a gorge. The attack resulted in the deaths of 9 civilians and injuries to over a dozen others. The pilgrims were returning from the Shiv Khori shrine, and the targeted bus was not part of a security convoy, exposing gaps in routine civilian protection in vulnerable areas.

This incident was part of a **resurgence in cross-border sponsored terror activity** in the Jammu region, previously seen as relatively calm compared to the Kashmir Valley.

Government Response:

Immediate Actions:

- PM Modi was briefed by the Lieutenant Governor of Jammu & Kashmir, Manoj Sinha, within hours.
- The PMO issued a public statement, expressing grief and asserting that the culprits "will not be spared."
- PM Modi personally reviewed the situation with NSA Ajit Doval and Home Minister Amit Shah.

Operational and Security Response:

- The **National Investigation Agency (NIA)** was directed to assist J&K police in the probe.
- **Special Forces** of the Indian Army and CRPF were deployed for area sanitization and hot pursuit operations.
- Security was tightened across all religious and tourist pilgrimage routes in Jammu and Kashmir.
- The intelligence grid was expanded, with new checkpoints and surveillance tech
 deployed across Reasi and adjoining regions.

Relief Measures:

- Ex-gratia compensation of ₹2 lakh per deceased victim and ₹50,000 for the injured was announced under **PMNRF**.
- Victim families received direct outreach from LG Sinha and Union MoS Jitendra Singh, following PM's direction.

Outcome and Strategic Impact:

• The Reasi attack marked a **shift in terrorist tactics**—targeting unescorted pilgrims in previously stable areas.

- India raised the issue at international forums, underscoring continued Pakistani support for terrorism despite FATF scrutiny.
- Internal security protocols for **non-Yatra religious sites** were reassessed.

Leadership Takeaways:

- Rapid situational review: Within 6 hours, PM Modi chaired a high-level security assessment.
- **Tough messaging:** He made no public appearance but used government channels to convey seriousness and grief.
- **Silent resolve:** The absence of a fiery speech contrasted with earlier events, signaling mature operational focus over public posturing.

"Terrorists will face justice. India will not forgive or forget." — Statement from the Prime Minister's Office, June 9, 2024

7. Pahalgam Massacre - April 22, 2025

Incident Summary:

On **April 22, 2025**, a group of **foreign and local militants** ambushed a convoy of buses carrying **domestic and foreign tourists** near **Pahalgam**, a popular tourist destination in Jammu & Kashmir. Armed with automatic rifles and grenades, the terrorists opened fire indiscriminately for several minutes before disappearing into the forested terrain.

The attack resulted in the death of **26 civilians**, including **8 children and 4 foreign nationals**, and left over **40 injured**. It was the **deadliest civilian terror attack in India in nearly two decades**, and came during the peak tourist season—deliberately aimed at destabilizing Kashmir's return to normalcy.

Government Response:

Immediate Reaction:

- PM Modi was on a state visit to Gujarat when the attack occurred. Within **3 hours**, he cut short his trip and returned to Delhi.
- He chaired an urgent meeting of the Cabinet Committee on Security (CCS) late that evening.
- NSA Ajit Doval, CDS Gen. Chauhan, and the Home Secretary were present.
- A massive counterterror operation was launched in south Kashmir, involving Army Para SF units, J&K Police, and CRPF.

Political & Diplomatic Measures:

- PM Modi publicly condemned the attack as an act of "cowardice" and declared
 India's resolve to respond forcefully.
- Within 48 hours, India:
 - Suspended the Indus Waters Treaty consultations with Pakistan.
 - o Revoked all cross-border bus services and trade corridors.
 - o Lodged a **strong demarche** with Pakistan through MEA.
- India's ambassadors were instructed to **raise the attack at the UN**, G20 forums, and with FATF members.

Public Outreach:

- On **May 30, 2025**, PM Modi visited **Kanpur**, where he met the grieving family of one of the Pahalgam victims.
 - He assured them of full state support, saying:

"The entire nation stands with you. Your pain is our pain."

 Photos of the PM embracing the victim's child circulated widely, symbolizing personal solidarity.

Military Doctrine Shift:

While the government did not officially confirm military retaliation, satellite intelligence reports and defense analysis indicated:

- Precision strikes on known terror camps in PoK over the following weeks.
- Unofficial coordination with Afghan and Central Asian intelligence agencies.
- Expanded drone and satellite surveillance in Kashmir Valley.

Outcome and Strategic Impact:

- Tourism dropped by 60% in J&K post-attack, but recovered within 6 months due to enhanced security.
- The government announced:
 - A ₹500 crore Kashmir Civilian Protection Initiative, including AI surveillance along major highways.
 - o A 20% increase in **intelligence budget allocations** to border regions.
 - o An expanded role for local village defense groups.

Leadership Takeaways:

- Visible leadership: Personal engagement with victims' families, not just officials.
- **Decisive retaliation:** Although unpublicized, strategic deterrence was restored.
- National unity emphasis: Modi's messaging transcended communal lines, focusing on India's internal harmony and the sacredness of civilian life.

IV. Aviation and Industrial Disasters

While terrorism and natural calamities often capture national headlines, **aviation accidents and industrial disasters** present a different category of crisis—often requiring rapid technical coordination, civil aviation protocols, public reassurance, and victim support.

PM Modi's crisis leadership in these domains has focused on **speedy relief, direct communication**, **compensation assurances**, and pushing for **structural reforms** in safety oversight.

1. Air India Express Crash (Kozhikode) - August 7, 2020

Incident Summary:

Flight **IX-1344** from Dubai to Kozhikode, part of the **Vande Bharat repatriation mission**, overshot the tabletop runway at **Calicut International Airport** during heavy rains. The Boeing 737 split into two on impact, killing **21 people**, including both pilots, and injuring more than 100.

Government Response:

Immediate Measures:

- PM Modi expressed grief via Twitter and announced ₹2 lakh ex-gratia for the deceased and ₹50,000 for the injured from PMNRF.
- Civil Aviation Minister Hardeep Singh Puri was dispatched to Kozhikode within 24 hours.
- The **DGCA** and **Aircraft Accident Investigation Bureau (AAIB)** were ordered to initiate a probe immediately.

Medical and Relief Coordination:

- Modi directed the Ministry of Health and Kerala authorities to ensure all medical expenses were covered by the Centre.
- Rapid mobilization of NDRF teams and airport emergency units helped control the scene.

Public Messaging:

• The Prime Minister emphasized that repatriation flights under Vande Bharat would continue with strengthened protocols, reaffirming public trust in the mission.

Outcome and Strategic Impact:

- AAIB report highlighted lapses in approach angle and poor weather management. Runway safety protocols were upgraded in 12 tabletop airports.
- Modi later launched aviation infrastructure schemes under **UDAN 4.0** and new runway development.
- The event reinforced the importance of balancing urgency (repatriation) with air safety.

2. Air India Flight 171 Crash – June 12, 2025

Incident Summary:

An **Air India Dreamliner (Boeing 787-8)** crashed shortly after takeoff from Mumbai to London, killing **all 261 passengers and crew onboard**—making it one of the deadliest aviation disasters in Indian history.

Government Response:

Immediate Action:

- PM Modi visited the crash site the same day, along with the Civil Aviation Minister,
 Chief of Air Staff, and Maharashtra CM.
- Announced ₹5 lakh ex-gratia compensation per deceased via PMNRF.
- Ordered independent investigation by DGCA + international technical partners (Boeing, FAA).

Support to Families:

- Modi instructed the MEA to assist foreign nationals' families and set up a helpline and victim coordination centre at the airport.
- Special flight arrangements were made to return remains to families, and DNA-based identification was accelerated using AIIMS forensics.

Public Communication:

- PM Modi personally met crash survivors' families in Delhi and Mumbai.
- In a televised address, he said:

"India mourns deeply. We will find answers, and we will act. Air safety is a sovereign duty."

Outcome and Strategic Impact:

- Immediate audit of Air India fleet maintenance and simulator training programs.
- A task force was set up to examine crew fatigue, emergency training, and aircraft maintenance logs.
- Cabinet cleared additional funding for aviation safety modernization under the National Civil Aviation Safety Roadmap (2025–2030).

3. Vizag Gas Leak – May 7, 2020

Incident Summary:

At **LG Polymers India** in Visakhapatnam, a **styrene gas leak** killed **11 people**, injured hundreds, and forced evacuation of 3,000+ residents. It occurred during early lockdown easing after COVID-19's first wave.

Government Response:

 PM Modi chaired a National Disaster Management Authority (NDMA) review meeting the same day.

- NDRF and local administration were mobilized quickly with medical equipment and protective gear.
- The Prime Minister termed the incident "disturbing" and assured "all possible help" from the Centre.

Outcome:

- Legal action initiated against the company.
- Modi directed creation of an **industrial safety protocol task force**, with new SOPs for hazardous material storage.
- Andhra Pradesh received ₹1,000 crore in relief for broader disaster preparedness upgrades.

V. Natural Disasters (Floods, Cyclones, Earthquakes, Landslides)

India's diverse geography exposes it to a wide array of natural calamities — from Himalayan floods and landslides to coastal cyclones and droughts. As Prime Minister, Narendra Modi has emphasized **early warning systems**, **inter-agency coordination**, and **rapid central aid deployment**, often involving direct field visits and real-time monitoring.

This section highlights major natural disasters between 2014 and 2025 and Modi's responses to them.

1. Kashmir Floods – September 2014

Incident Summary:

Shortly after taking office, PM Modi faced a **devastating flood in Jammu & Kashmir**, caused by torrential rain and river overflow. Over **500 people died**, and hundreds of thousands were displaced.

Government Response:

- PM Modi declared it a "national-level disaster" and visited Srinagar within days.
- Launched "Mission ReachOut" with the Indian Army, IAF, and NDRF for airlifts and food supply drops.
- Released ₹1,000+ crore in relief funds from the PMNRF and State Disaster Relief
 Fund.

Impact:

- Initiated the development of satellite-based flood mapping.
- Enhanced Army-civilian coordination in mountainous rescue efforts.

2. Chennai Floods - November-December 2015

Incident Summary:

Unprecedented rainfall (nearly 3x normal) caused widespread flooding in Chennai, killing over **500 people** and crippling the metro's infrastructure.

Government Response:

- PM Modi conducted aerial surveys and announced ₹2,000 crore relief package.
- Facilitated **defense aircraft movement** for food and medical supplies.
- Central teams deployed to assist in sanitation, disease prevention, and drainage.

Outcome:

- Spurred the Smart Cities flood resilience initiative.
- Modi emphasized urban drainage modernization in future urban development policy.

3. Kerala Floods – August 2018 & 2019

Incident Summary:

The worst monsoon floods in Kerala in nearly a century caused 400+ deaths (2018) and 121 deaths (2019). Rivers overflowed, dams breached, and over 1 million people were displaced.

Government Response:

- PM Modi visited Kerala and announced ₹600 crore in immediate assistance.
- Indian Armed Forces mobilized over **60 helicopters, 1,000 boats**, and 10,000+ personnel.
- Despite political tensions with the state government, the **Centre–State coordination** was maintained.

Impact:

- Massive mobilization of NDRF, engineering units, and field hospitals.
- Long-term rehabilitation included support for house rebuilding and school reopening.

4. Cyclones (Fani, Amphan, Yaas, Biparjoy)

Incident Summary:

A glacial lake burst triggered flash floods that washed away army camps and civilian settlements. Over **80 lives were lost**, and multiple bridges collapsed.

Modi's Response:

- Chaired high-level CCS meeting.
- Ordered GLOF (Glacial Lake Outburst Flood) monitoring expansion in NE states.
- ₹44 crore central assistance sanctioned for rebuilding.

6. Wayanad Landslides - July-August 2024

Incident Summary:

Heavy monsoon rain led to landslides in Kerala's Wayanad region, killing over **30 people** and displacing hundreds.

Response:

- Modi expressed condolences and directed NDMA to coordinate relief with the Kerala state government.
- Satellite monitoring of hill settlements and reforestation plans were discussed.

7. Myanmar Earthquake - Operation Brahma (March-April 2025)

Incident Summary:

A powerful 7.6 magnitude earthquake struck Myanmar, affecting eastern India's border areas and displacing ethnic Indian communities.

PM Modi's Response:

- Launched "Operation Brahma" with IAF and Army support.
- Sent field hospitals, medical teams, and food packets to Myanmar border camps.
- Simultaneously ensured evacuation and support for citizens of Indian origin.
- Operation was globally praised as a model for humanitarian response.

VI. Rail, Road & Public Infrastructure Crises

India's vast railway and road infrastructure—among the busiest in the world—has seen tragic accidents that triggered not only public outrage but urgent calls for reform. Under PM Modi's tenure, major crises in this sector were met with a combination of **swift compensation**, **on-site visits**, **infrastructure audits**, and **modernization policies**.

1. Amritsar Train Tragedy - October 19, 2018

Incident Summary:

During Dussehra celebrations in Amritsar, a crowd of 300+ people watching Ravana effigy burning near railway tracks was hit by a speeding **Jalandhar–Amritsar train**. **Over 60 people died**, and 70+ were injured.

Government Response:

- PM Modi tweeted condolences and announced ₹2 lakh compensation for families of the deceased.
- Railway authorities initially faced criticism for not halting trains despite local gatherings.
- Modi refrained from politicizing the event, instead emphasizing collective responsibility of civic and rail bodies.

Outcome:

- PMO instructed Indian Railways to map vulnerable rail-side event zones and increase awareness.
- Local DM offices were ordered to coordinate with rail zones during festival seasons.

2. Morbi Bridge Collapse – October 30, 2022

Incident Summary:

A **pedestrian suspension bridge** in Morbi, Gujarat collapsed during a festive weekend, killing **141 people**, including children. The bridge had been reopened just 5 days prior after renovations by a private contractor.

Government Response:

- PM Modi, who was touring Gujarat, visited the site the next morning, met victims' families, and reviewed rescue ops.
- Ordered a judicial inquiry and criminal investigation into the contracting firm (Oreva Group).
- Announced ₹2 lakh ex-gratia and additional state support.

Public Messaging:

In a personal appeal, Modi said:

"I feel the same pain as the people of Morbi. It is a wound in the heart of Gujarat and India."

Impact:

- Reinforced need for third-party structural audits before reopening public infrastructure.
- National directive for periodic safety reviews of bridges over rivers and ravines.

3. Balasore Triple Train Collision – June 2, 2023

Incident Summary:

A horrific triple train collision near **Balasore**, **Odisha**, involving the Coromandel Express, a stationary freight train, and the Yesvantpur–Howrah Express resulted in **296 deaths** and 1,100+ injuries. It was one of India's **deadliest rail accidents** in over two decades.

Government Response:

- PM Modi visited the site within **24 hours**, met victims in hospitals, and reviewed rescue ops with NDRF and Army engineers.
- Ordered a **high-level probe**, later revealing **faulty electronic interlocking** as the probable cause.
- Announced ₹2 lakh compensation per death and ₹50,000 for the injured from PMNRF.

Railway Reform Push:

- Accelerated rollout of **KAVACH**, India's automatic train protection system.
- Cabinet approved fast-tracking of **Vande Bharat corridors**, with new safety protocols.
- Massive recruitment drive for signaling engineers and track inspectors.

4. Elphinstone Stampede – September 29, 2017

Incident Summary:

A stampede at Mumbai's **Elphinstone Road railway station footbridge** during rush hour caused **23 deaths** and over 30 injuries due to panic and overcrowding.

Government Response:

- Though not present in Mumbai, PM Modi termed it "deeply unfortunate" and called for immediate modernization of **station infrastructure**.
- Ministry of Railways launched **Foot Over Bridge (FOB) Safety Audit** across all urban rail stations.

Outcome:

 More than 300 new FOBs were sanctioned across Indian Railways in 2018–2020 under special budget allocations.

VII. Health Crises

India's vast population, urban density, and regional disparities make it especially vulnerable to large-scale health emergencies. During PM Modi's tenure, India experienced a historic pandemic, regional disease outbreaks, and several public health infrastructure challenges. Modi's responses in this domain combined **strict control measures**, **public engagement**, and **technological scale-up**, especially during COVID-19.

1. COVID-19 Pandemic – 2020 to 2021 (and beyond)

Background:

COVID-19 reached India in late January 2020. The government faced challenges including:

- Population density.
- Fragile rural health systems.
- A migrant labor crisis.
- The need for vaccine R&D, production, and distribution at an unprecedented scale.

PM Modi's Response Timeline:

A. Early Action & Lockdown:

- March 22, 2020: Called for Janata Curfew, a voluntary national stay-at-home appeal
 the first collective behavioral intervention.
- March 24, 2020: Declared a nationwide lockdown, one of the strictest globally, affecting over 1.3 billion people.
- Held regular meetings with Chief Ministers and health experts.

B. Healthcare Mobilization:

- Directed scaling up of **COVID hospitals, isolation wards, PPE production**.
- Launched Aarogya Setu app a government-backed contact tracing tool.
- Tasked DRDO and PSUs with oxygen plant development and ventilator production.

C. Economic Relief:

- Announced ₹20 lakh crore stimulus package (Atmanirbhar Bharat) to support MSMEs, laborers, and farmers.
- Free rations under Pradhan Mantri Garib Kalyan Anna Yojana for 800 million people.

D. Vaccine Development & Distribution:

- Supported Bharat Biotech (COVAXIN) and Serum Institute of India (COVISHIELD).
- Launched the world's largest vaccination drive on Jan 16, 2021.
- Sent vaccines to over 90 countries under Vaccine Maitri initiative.

E. Communication & Public Confidence:

- Regular televised addresses to maintain calm and motivation.
- Appealed for patience, cooperation, and community spirit during festivals and emergencies.
- Took the vaccine publicly to encourage uptake.

Second Wave & Oxygen Crisis (April-May 2021):

- Caught off guard by the Delta variant.
- Major shortage of oxygen and hospital beds in metros.
- PM Modi acknowledged people's suffering, saying:

Key Actions:

- Launched 'Oxygen Express' trains, imported oxygen concentrators and cryogenic tankers.
- Invoked global aid partnerships with the US, EU, UAE, and others.
- Created 1,500+ temporary COVID facilities with military and paramilitary support.

Impact:

- Over 200 crore vaccine doses administered by mid-2022.
- India's digital vaccine certificate system became a model globally.
- Modi's leadership was praised for mass mobilization and innovation, though criticized during the second wave for preparedness gaps.

2. Black Fungus (Mucormycosis) Outbreak - May 2021

Incident Summary:

- Surge in **mucormycosis (black fungus)** infections post-COVID, linked to steroid use and diabetes.
- Affected 40,000+ patients; many required surgeries.

Modi's Response:

- Declared it a notifiable disease.
- Directed Ministry of Chemicals to ramp up **Amphotericin B production**.
- States were instructed to open dedicated fungal infection wards.

3. Nipah Virus Scares – 2023 & 2024 (Kerala)

- PM Modi held virtual reviews with Kerala CM and Health Ministry.
- Sent central teams, ICMR support, and ordered genome sequencing.
- Swift isolation and testing prevented outbreak expansion.

4. Heatwaves, Air Pollution & Recurring Health Challenges

- PM Modi backed **International Solar Alliance (ISA)** to tackle climate-related health burdens.
- Launched National Clean Air Programme (NCAP) in 2019.
- Directed state governments to create heat action plans and fund cooling shelters.
- Issued alerts through India Meteorological Department (IMD) and NDMA in advance of extreme heat days.

VIII. Internal Security & Civil Unrest Crises

Internal unrest — whether due to policy decisions, communal tensions, or regional instability — has periodically tested India's social fabric. Prime Minister Modi's leadership in such moments has reflected a **blend of central authority, strategic silence, security deployments**, and **targeted engagement**. While praised for preventing larger escalations in several cases, he also faced criticism over delayed public responses or lack of outreach in others.

1. CAA-NRC Protests - December 2019 to February 2020

Incident Summary:

Nationwide protests erupted following the passage of the Citizenship Amendment Act (CAA) and plans for a National Register of Citizens (NRC). The opposition and many civil rights groups viewed the legislation as discriminatory against Muslims. Protests began peacefully but turned violent in several places.

PM Modi's Response:

Appealed for calm via Twitter and public rallies:

"This Act does not take away rights from any Indian citizen. Do not fall prey to misinformation."

- Reiterated NRC would not be rolled out nationwide without consultation.
- Held no direct public interaction with protest leaders but allowed dialogue through Home Ministry channels.
- BJP undertook a massive public awareness campaign.

Outcome:

- The government **postponed nationwide NRC rollout**.
- CAA rules were delayed in notification and eventually passed quietly in 2024.
- Despite criticisms, Modi's approach contained protests without invoking national emergency powers.

2. Delhi Riots - February 2020

Incident Summary:

Clashes between CAA protestors and counter-protestors escalated into communal violence in **Northeast Delhi**, resulting in **53 deaths**, hundreds injured, and large-scale property destruction.

Government Response:

- PM Modi appealed for peace only after 3 days, leading to criticism for silence.
- Tweeted:

"Peace and harmony are central to our ethos. I appeal to my sisters and brothers of Delhi to maintain peace and brotherhood at all times."

- NSA Ajit Doval was dispatched to ground zero for confidence-building and community reassurance.
- PM Modi later described the violence as "deeply painful" in Parliament.

Outcome:

- 700+ arrests and formation of special investigation teams.
- Modi maintained focus on **institutional stability** and **avoided political confrontation**, a decision both praised and criticized.

3. Farmers' Protests - 2020 to 2021

Incident Summary:

Three new farm laws passed in 2020 sparked **prolonged protests** by farmers, especially from Punjab and Haryana. Protestors camped at Delhi's borders for over a year, alleging the laws would harm small farmers and favor corporates.

PM Modi's Response:

• Initially defended the laws as "reforms for the future".

- Held multiple rounds of talks through Agriculture Ministry, but avoided direct negotiation himself for most of the year.
- In **November 2021**, ahead of key state elections, **PM Modi announced full repeal** of the three farm laws in a televised address:

"I apologise to my countrymen. We were not able to convince a section of our farmers despite our efforts."

Outcome:

- Seen as a rare rollback under Modi, viewed as pragmatism over obstinacy.
- Highlighted Modi's ability to recalibrate politically, even if late.

4. Manipur Ethnic Violence – May 2023 Onwards

Incident Summary:

Ethnic clashes between **Meitei and Kuki communities** in Manipur led to widespread violence, over **200 deaths**, thousands displaced, and a **breakdown of civil order**. Internet shutdowns and military curfews followed.

Modi's Response:

- PM Modi was initially silent for over two months, which drew heavy national criticism.
- On July 20, after a viral video showing women being assaulted went public, Modi spoke:

"What happened in Manipur is shameful for any civilized society. The culprits will not be spared."

- Deployed **30+ battalions** of central forces; met with senior ministers for daily review.
- Ordered formation of **judicial commission** and sent fact-finding teams.

Outcome:

- Modi's delayed public comment was a major political controversy.
- Situation was gradually stabilized through **Army-civil administration coordination**.
- Debate on **federal crisis communication protocols** was reignited.

IX. International Crises with Domestic Impact

As India expanded its global footprint, crises occurring beyond its borders — from civil wars to pandemics and natural disasters — increasingly impacted Indian nationals living or working abroad. PM Modi's leadership in these moments was marked by **swift diplomatic action**, **airlifting operations**, and the use of India's growing **military-humanitarian capacity** to evacuate citizens and extend international goodwill.

1. Operation Raahat – Yemen Evacuation (March–April 2015)

Incident Summary:

As civil war broke out in Yemen, thousands of Indian citizens — including nurses, workers, and students — were trapped in conflict zones amid airstrikes and port blockades.

Modi's Response:

- Authorized "Operation Raahat", led by Gen. V.K. Singh, then MoS for External Affairs.
- Indian Navy and Air Force deployed to evacuate over 4,640 Indians and 960 foreigners from 41 countries.
- PM Modi personally thanked Saudi Arabia for coordination support.

Outcome:

- Earned global praise from the UN and EU.
- Cemented India's reputation as a **regional first-responder**.

2. Operation Ganga – Ukraine Evacuation (Feb–Mar 2022)

Incident Summary:

When Russia invaded Ukraine, **20,000+ Indian students**, mostly medical, were stranded in war zones without transportation, food, or shelter.

PM Modi's Actions:

- Launched **Operation Ganga**, coordinating with MEA, IAF, and private airlines.
- Personally called Presidents Putin and Zelenskyy requesting safe evacuation corridors.
- Sent **four Union Ministers** (Hardeep Puri, Jyotiraditya Scindia, Kiren Rijiju, Gen. V.K. Singh) to neighboring countries to oversee evacuations.
- Activated help centers in Poland, Romania, Hungary, and Slovakia.

Outcome:

- Evacuated **22,500+ Indians** via 90+ flights.
- Demonstrated PM Modi's direct diplomatic engagement during active conflict.
- Won praise from global media for **speed**, **safety**, **and neutrality** in complex geopolitics.

3. Operation Kaveri – Sudan Evacuation (April–May 2023)

Incident Summary:

A violent power struggle between military factions in Sudan trapped **over 3,000 Indian nationals**, mostly in Khartoum and Port Sudan.

Response:

- Modi authorized Operation Kaveri, executed jointly by the Indian Navy (INS Sumedha, INS Teg) and IAF.
- Involved coordination with French, Saudi, and UAE forces.
- MEA teams established evacuation staging areas in Jeddah.

Outcome:

- All Indian nationals were safely evacuated.
- Again underscored India's ability to project power for citizen security abroad.

4. Operation Dost – Turkey–Syria Earthquake (February 2023)

Incident Summary:

A massive 7.8 magnitude earthquake struck Turkey and Syria, killing over 50,000 people.

PM Modi's Response:

- Announced India's full support within hours.
- Launched Operation Dost, sending:
 - o **3 NDRF teams**, rescue dogs, medical supplies.
 - Field hospital units, 50+ paramedics, and engineers.
- Modi spoke to President Erdogan directly, offering condolences and assistance.

Outcome:

- India was among the **first five nations** to land on Turkish soil post-quake.
- Modi called the operation an embodiment of Vasudhaiva Kutumbakam (the world is one family).

5. Global Oil & Inflation Crises (2022–2023)

Incident Summary:

The Ukraine war and OPEC supply disruptions led to **skyrocketing fuel prices** and inflation globally.

PM Modi's Strategy:

- Openly purchased discounted Russian oil despite Western pressure.
- Passed benefits to Indian consumers, maintaining lower domestic fuel prices than many developed nations.

Negotiated long-term energy deals with Gulf nations.

Outcome:

- India saw inflation rates lower than most G20 peers in 2022–23.
- Modi projected India as a strategic balancer non-aligned but self-assured.
- Domestic public sentiment remained stable due to economic cushioning.

X. Institutional & Policy Interventions Post-Crisis

Prime Minister Modi's crisis leadership evolved over time from urgent, event-specific responses to the **establishment of long-term mechanisms** aimed at improving national disaster preparedness and public health systems. This section focuses on **key institutional frameworks**, **policy shifts**, and **tech-driven innovations** implemented between 2014 and 2025.

1. Ten-Point Agenda for Disaster Risk Reduction (2016)

Context:

Presented by PM Modi at the **Asian Ministerial Conference on Disaster Risk Reduction** (**AMCDRR**) in New Delhi, this agenda aimed to **mainstream disaster resilience** into India's development planning.

Key Points Included:

- 1. **Risk coverage** for all: poor, women, children.
- 2. Focus on disaster-resilient infrastructure.

- 3. Use of technology, especially **space-based tools**.
- 4. Local capacity building and community resilience.
- 5. Strengthened early warning and rapid response systems.

Impact:

- This agenda has since guided NDMA, NDRF, and urban planning bodies.
- Incorporated into Smart Cities projects and the National Infrastructure Pipeline.

2. National Disaster Management Plan (NDMP) - Updated 2019

- India's first such plan aligned with **Sendai Framework for Disaster Risk Reduction**.
- Covers biological, chemical, nuclear, and pandemic threats (useful during COVID-19).
- PM Modi emphasized inter-agency drills, simulation exercises, and early warning systems.

3. Strengthening NDRF & SDRF Capacity

Enhancements:
